Film & Lecture Series

The Film and Lecture Series sponsored by East Central College brings acclaimed documentaries and narrative films, scholars, authors, journalists and poets to campus throughout the year. The series is designed to introduce an essential component of education in helping audiences consider perspectives other than their own by broadening the basis for critical thought, enjoying various forms of artistic expression, promoting cultural understanding, and encouraging discussion.

Art

The East Central College Art Gallery's mission is to enhance education and to culturally enrich the daily life of art and design majors; ECC students, faculty, and staff; and the broader community. The Art Gallery hosts exhibitions that may pose questions or offer a new and differing point of view, thus serving as an educational resource. The art work in a given exhibit may inspire the viewer in terms of content or beauty or materials, thus acting as a place of cultural enrichment. By creating a place of repose or mental uplift, the Art Gallery serves to enhance campus life.



Music

The music department maintains a standard of excellence in the curricula and programs it offers. Students are inspired by solo and ensemble performances, festivals, workshops and guest artists' concerts. The educational and cultural opportunities provided by the music department enrich both the college and community. East Central College is an accredited member of the National Association of Schools of Music.

Theatre

ECC Theatre provides students with academic training and practical experience in a nurturing yet challenging educational environment along with serving as a cultural touchstone for the surrounding community. The department produces five mainstage shows per year, including three musicals, affording ample performance and learning opportunities.



Jennifer Higerd

Jennifer Higerd joined the East Central College faculty in 2010 as an Art Instructor and Gallery Coordinator. She received her Bachelor's Degree in French, Political Science and International Studies from Kansas State University. She also attended Fort Hays State University where she earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Graphic Design and a Master of Fine Arts in Ceramics. Prior to ECC, Ms. Higerd traveled extensively in Western Europe and taught in West Africa's Ivory Coast. Her artwork has been exhibited in regional and national juried competitions.



Adam Watkins

A multimedia artist and musician, Adam Watkins has taught art at ECC since 2006, where he also serves as Program Coordinator for Fine Art and Graphic Design. After earning his Bachelor of Fine Arts from Webster University, Mr. Watkins obtained his Master of Fine Arts from the Kent Institute of Art and Design in Canterbury, United Kingdom. His works, which deal with the notions of post-pop culture that we live in, have been exhibited throughout the United States and around the world.



Grace Austin

Entering her fourteenth year on the Theatre faculty at ECC, Ms. Austin holds a BFA from Texas State and an MFA from Virginia Commonwealth University. She has served on the summer musical theatre faculty at COCA where she directed the Missouri premiere of *In The Heights* and the 10 year anniversary production of *Ragtime*. Ms. Austin has also coached several students to the Missouri state performance finals. She is a member of the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers and works professionally with Variety Children's Theatre, Kirkwood Theatre Guild, The Veiled Prophet Parade, Ozark Actor's Theatre and other performance venues in the area. Chris Swanson is in her fifth year as Theatre Instructor at ECC. She earned both her Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts in Communication with an emphasis in Theatre from Morehead State University. Her previous theatre work experience includes working as a carpenter, resident lighting designer and technical director for several regional theaters. Prior to joining the ECC faculty, Ms. Swanson was the assistant technical director/instructor for Shenandoah Conservatory in Virginia and a sales consultant for Mainstage Theatrical Supply and Ovation Designs.









Aaron Bounds began his teaching career at East Central College in 2008. He directs the Concert Band, Jazz Band and Jazz Combo. Mr. Bounds attended Missouri State University, earning a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education and a Master's Degree in Music. While an undergraduate student, he spent two summers performing with the Madison Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps. He performs with The Starlighters, a local swing band, and the St. Louis Philharmonic. Mr. Bounds is also a substitute for the Gateway City Band.

Dr. Jennifer Judd

Dr. Jennifer Judd is Professor of Music at ECC. She holds a Doctorate in Musical Arts from the University of Missouri - Kansas City Conservatory of Music. Dr. Judd was the artist in residence at ECC prior to becoming a full-time member of the music faculty in 2002. During her tenure she has given more than 300 performances in concert halls, area schools and in the community. She maintains a vigorous concert schedule, and in recent seasons has performed as a soloist and chamber musician in Sweden, China, Spain, Italy, Philippines and throughout the region. She is a Music Teachers National Association Permanent Certificated Teacher of Music. In 2012, she received the Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. In 2013, she also received the Emerson Excellence in Teaching Award.


Dr. Tim Sexton

TONY RENNER, "07, 17 SHOW: A TONY RENNER EXHIBITION"

May 30 - August 25

Tony Renner began painting in June 2007 almost immediately after completing his Master's thesis in American Culture Studies. "Painting was as far from writing as I could get," he says. Renner has exhibited work at various locations throughout St. Louis and he received an award of excellence from Art St. Louis jurors in 2007. Renner's practice provides a useful set of allegorical tools for maneuvering with a pseudo-minimalist approach in the world of painting: these meticulously planned works resound and resonate with the viewer. With a subtle minimalistic approach, he investigates the dynamics of painting, including the manipulation of its effects and the limits of spectacle. Rather than presenting a factual reality, Renner creates an illusion to challenge the realms of our imagination.

JENN BROWN & SARA WEININGER, WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY GRADUATE STUDENT SHOW, "IN BETWEEN"

JENN BROWN STATEMENT

"There's a space between an inner discomfort that is good, challenging, and the type that is enfeebling. When you are so uncomfortable within your own headspace, with your own sense of "otherness," it becomes a constant check of emotions, a consistent questioning of your own stability. It can be very easy to get trapped within this space. It festers into a kind of barrier, an existential armor. The longer we're trapped, the more intricately wound the armor becomes, and the more it grafts to us. It's a lovely hindrance. Something that starts as a means of protection and self-preservation becomes debilitating. It's beautiful and tragic, it's phantasmagoric, it's grotesque, it's elegant and, it's terrifying."

SARA WEININGER STATEMENT

"I sat on the floors of many rooms when I was very little. I could hear people talking about things bigger than me. To escape these things, I dug for crayons and paper in a crowded knapsack. With these, I made my first drawings. Drawing is both the source and structure for my present work. Awkward dreamlike perspectives are constructed through a physical building up of marks. My current body of work aims to describe "many rooms" through both memory and present thought. These imagined environments emerge through immediate perceptual experience, as well as through the malleability and instability of memory."

KERRA TAYLOR, "THE THEATRICS OF STORYTELLING"
