Preparation Tips for Faster, Stress-free Service

- 1. Have your ID out and ready for Testing Center staff. We accept many forms of photo identification: student ID, driver's license, work IDs, etc., but we cannot give you an exam without photo identification.
- 2. Know your instructor's name. All exams are filed by instructor name, and in order for us to promptly serve you, we need this information to quickly locate your exam.
- Need a Scantron? Headphones or ear buds? Are you allowed notes or books? Need to borrow a calculator?
 Be prepared for what you need or are allowed to access during your exam, and have those items out and ready.

The Testing Center staff are here to make your finals as stress free as possible. We realize that your schedule may cause you to test at the last minute.
