Surviving Finals Week

- (1) Organize your finals. Write down the dates of each of the final exams along with the time and place of the final. The college publishes a schedule of the times for all finals; ask your instructor where the final exam will be administered.
- (2) Stay healthy. This includes getting enough sleep, eating properly, and exercising. Although you may be tempted to pull an "all-nighter," your lack of sleep may make you less alert when you take your final. Be sure to eat a healthy, balanced diet, with lots of fruits and vegetables. And get out and exercise when you have the opportunity.
- (3) Turn off distractions. When preparing for finals, do not spend an excessive amount of time on your cell phone, computer, or other electronic devices. Knowing how easily time can slip away when one is playing games, checking up on social media, or surfing the web should serve as a deterrent from spending too much time on them.
- (4) Take some time off. Although finals week may appear to be a time of studying and test-taking during all the waking hours of the day, it is beneficial to take a little time off to do something that you enjoy doing. You could go to a movie, spend time with friends and family, or just relax for an hour or two.
