Graduation, Transfer & Retention Rates

The Student Right to Know Act requires an institution that participates in any student financial assistance program under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (as amended) to disclose information about the graduation, transfer-out, and retention rates of certificate- or degree-seeking, first-time, full-time, undergraduate students. Additionally, graduation and transfer rates must be disclosed by the following disaggregated groups: gender, major racial and ethnic subgroups (as defined by IPEDS), recipients of a Federal Pell Grant, recipients of a subsidized Direct Stafford Loan (who did not receive Pell), students who did not receive Pell or a subsidized Direct Stafford Loan, and any student that is awarded athletically-related student aid.
