

# Check Your Progress for Midterms

Midterms are coming! For many students, this is a scary thought at best and a frightening thought at worst. The best approach to midterms is to consider them to be the first half of the final exam. You'll only be studying for half of a test. That's not so bad.

There are some general things that you can do to get ready. Here's a check list to follow for this half-exam:

### **#1 Take Care of Yourself**

Eat healthy.
Sleep 8 hours/day (no more).
Exercise, a good excuse for a break.

### #2 Don't Cram

Skim over the textbook, notes, old tests, quizzes, and the syllabus to pick out what is important and what you found difficult.

Do the study guide. Don't have one? Make your own.

Listen to what the professor thinks is important / interesting; that may be a hint.

Make an appointment at The Learning Center for help.

### #3 Practice, Practice

Practice concepts that were difficult for you in the past.

Work with a study group.

Study in a quiet environment.

# **How to Prepare for The Learning Center**



**Go to Class.** A good tutoring session starts in class. Attend every class and take good notes. If you miss a class, go to your instructor's office hours to get caught up; tutors are not meant to teach you what you missed in class.

**D.I.Y.** If you run into trouble on a homework assignment, try other problems and get as much of the assignment done as you can. Making an attempt, even a mistaken attempt, reinforces your understanding of concepts and aids later recall.

Bring your Confusion. Before your appointment, think about whether the problems you don't understand have a concept in common with each other. Be prepared to discuss that concept with your tutor.



**Proofread.** Time with your tutor is valuable and your tutor isn't going to proofread your paper for you. Two good ways to eliminate typos, misspellings, and other mechanical errors is to read your paper out loud or have a friend read it with you.

**Be Specific.** Now that you've read your paper, arrive prepared with specific questions about how to improve your paper. For example, ask about transition sentences if you would like to improve the flow of your paper.

**Change is Good.** Use The Learning Center early and often. Ask for help with anything from picking a topic to improving a final draft, but be ready to make changes. Your tutor will always have suggestions.

### No Matter What the Subject, Schedule an Appointment

The Learning Center offers free tutoring five days a week. The best way to make sure you can meet with a tutor is to schedule an appointment by calling (636)584-6688 or stopping by the main desk.
