Film & Lecture

The Film and Lecture Series brings acclaimed documentaries and narrative films, scholars, authors, journalists and poets to campus throughout the year. The series is designed to enhance essential components of education by providing audiences with avenues for exercising critical thought, appreciating various forms of artistic expression, deepening cultural understanding, and participating in discussion.

Art

The ECC Art Gallery's mission is to enhance education and to culturally enrich the daily life of art and design majors; ECC students, faculty, and staff; and the broader community. The Art Gallery hosts exhibitions that may pose questions or offer a new and differing point of view, thus serving as an educational resource. The artwork in a given exhibit may inspire the viewer in terms of content, beauty or materials, thus acting as a place of cultural enrichment. By creating a place of repose or mental uplift, the Art Gallery serves to enhance campus life.

Music

The music department maintains a standard of excellence in the curricula and programs it offers. Students are inspired by solo and ensemble performances, festivals, workshops, and a guest artist series. The educational and cultural opportunities provided by the music department enrich both the college and community. ECC is an accredited member of the National Association of Schools of Music.

Theatre

ECC Theatre provides students with academic training and practical experience in a nurturing yet challenging educational environment as well as serving as a cultural touchstone for the surrounding community. The department produces multiple main-stage shows per year, affording ample performance and learning opportunities.

Assistant Professor Grace Austin joined the ECC Theatre faculty in 2003. She holds a BFA from Texas State University and an MFA from Virginia Commonwealth University. Ms. Austin also serves as a Resident Teaching Artist at the Center of Creative Arts, St. Louis and has coached several students to the Missouri state performance finals. She also works professionally with Variety Children's Theatre. The Fox Theatre, The MUNY, Ozark Actors Theatre, New Jewish Theatre and Opera Theatre of Saint Louis

Bess Moynihan

Bess Moynihan has been a versatile Theatre Artist in the St. Louis region for over 12 years. Most recently she has worked as a Lighting and Scenic Designer and Technical Director for a number of professional companies including Mustard Seed Theatre, The Midnight Company, COCA, and SATE Ensemble Theatre. Before ECC, she was the Production Manager at Washington University and a Teaching Artist for COCAbiz. Bess holds a Master's Degree in Theatre Arts with an emphasis in Producing and Directing from Fontbonne University.

Jennifer Higerd

Jennifer Higerd joined the ECC faculty in 2010 as an Art Instructor and Gallery Coordinator. She received her Bachelor's Degree in French, Political Science and International Studies from Kansas State University. She also attended Fort Hays State University where she earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Graphic Design and a Master of Fine Arts in Ceramics. Prior to ECC, Ms. Higerd traveled extensively in Western Europe and taught in West Africa's Ivory Coast. Her artwork has been exhibited in regional and national juried competitions.

Aaron Bounds started in 2008 as Director of Bands at ECC - teaching World Music. Fundamentals of Music Theory, Music Appreciation, Low Brass private lessons. Jazz Combo. Anna Westfall & Sukjin Choi, "Shared Voices"

Westfall is a multi-disciplinary artist whose work often explores the complex relationship between memories, genetics, cycles in nature, and the larger system of culture that inform identity. Her sculptures and installations attempt to create the essence and energy found in the natural world while speaking to human perception and understanding of its character. Born in Korea, Sukjin Choi has had twenty-nine solo exhibitions in the United States, Australia, Canada, and Korea, and has been exhibited and collected in more than 150 museums and galleries throughout Europe, Asia, and the United States.



Mayuko Ono Gray, "Down the Throat, Heat Forgotten"

Mayuko Ono Gray is a Texas based artist whose main medium is graphite drawing. Born in Gifu Japan, she was trained in traditional Japanese calligraphy in her young childhood; later in her teenage years she was trained in classical Western drawing. Currently she works as adjunct professor of Art and the Art Gallery director for the College of the Mainland in Texas City, TX.
