Save time by getting a shot at the pharmacy

Did you know you can get a vaccine shot from a pharmacy in our Pharmacy Immunization Program? It's quick and easy. Most pharmacies are open longer hours than your doctor's office. And you don't need a prescription or an appointment. Just show up at the pharmacy. After all, you may already be going to your pharmacy to pick up a prescription.

Get protected with a vaccine *before* you get sick

Vaccines like a flu shot help your body fight disease if you're exposed to viruses. If you haven't had a vaccine before, talk to your doctor first to see if you should get one.

Pharmacies in our Pharmacy Immunization Program may give you vaccines for these illnesses:

- Flu Protects against different strains of the flu.
 Don't worry, the flu shot can't give you the flu. It helps your body fight the flu if you're exposed to the virus.¹
- Pneumonia Prevents pneumococcal disease caused by bacteria. These bacteria can cause serious health problems such as pneumonia, blood infections and meningitis. And the bacteria can spread from one person to another by close contact.²
- Shingles Helps prevent shingles. This is a painful skin rash, often with blisters. It's caused by the varicella zoster virus, which causes chickenpox and can appear years later as shingles.³

You decide where to go and when

Just go to a pharmacy that's part of the program and offers shots. You can find one close to home or work. Check the included list, or call a pharmacy to make sure it's in the program.

You don't need to make an appointment or fit the visit into your doctor's schedule. Just pick a time that works for *you*. Many of them are open after hours and on weekends.

No prescription needed from your doctor

Just show your member ID card at the pharmacy. You have the same coverage for when you get a shot at your doctor's office.
