Finals in the Testing Center: Tips and Tricks

As finals approach, the staff here at the Testing Center want to share important tips and tricks to help you have the smoothest testing experience possible.

- Make sure to have a photo ID with you each time you come to test.
 No ID? No test
- Make sure to communicate with your instructor(s) if you want to test in the Testing Center. They have to do some behind-the-scenes work to make that happen.
- Make sure to verify what materials are allowed for your exam. We will follow what instructors tell us.
- If you need a due date extension, your instructor must contact us before you can test. We can't administer an exam without their permission.
- Make sure to give yourself the full allotted time for your exam, even if you know you can finish it sooner. Even though Testing Center staff works hard to make sure that you can test without complications, some circumstances are out of our control. Giving yourself the full testing time helps to account for the unexpected.
- Remember, you know what you know and you know what you don't! If you get stuck on a question while testing, mark it for review and finish the exam. Then go back and review the questions you marked. It's better to finish your exam than to worry about one question and run out of time.
- When you feel like you're becoming stressed, close your eyes and take a deep breath to calm yourself. You've got this!
- Make sure to get plenty of rest and eat a well-balanced meal before testing. This will help your brain to function well.

Six Tips for Success in Online Courses

Summer is a great time to take an online course! Because you can work from anywhere, vacations, beach days, or even camping trips (Meramec has wi-fi for campers!) are no problem. Here are some tips to get you off on the right foot:

- 1. Communication is key to online classes. Don't be afraid to reach out to an instructor, but be sure you check Moodle and the syllabus first. Communicate about assignments well ahead of the deadline so your instructor has plenty of time to respond.
- 2. With #1 in mind, know your instructor's contact policy. Some instructors may not respond to emails for 24-48 hours. Some may respond quickly to texts. Some instructors provide their office phone, but they will barely be in their office all summer. Do your research and ask if necessary.
- 3. Assume you will have technical problems on days when important assignments are due. Planning ahead will save your sanity!
- 4. Schedule "class time" for yourself every week. Although you won't be driving to class, it's best to schedule blocks of time each week for your classwork. It is easy to put off online coursework. Don't fall into that trap.
- 5. Check grades often and clarify any questions as they come up, not just at the end of the semester, when it will be difficult for your instructor to help you.
- 6. For essay questions, forum posts, and papers, DO NOT compose in the text boxes provided. Open a Word document to write. Save often on your computer. Check for errors. Then, copy and paste your answer in the text box provided. Using Word, you don't risk losing all of your hard work if you have a problem with Moodle.

Success in online courses is all about planning and communication. Best wishes for a rewarding online experience!

1. When is your final?

Look at www.eastcentral.edu/registrar/final-exam-schedules/ to find out.

2. Start reviewing NOW!

Even if you are reading this at the beginning of the semester, you can already start preparing for the final.

- Print out review guide from the website: www.eastcentral.edu/science/mathematics/
- Know when review sessions are being held in the Learning Center.
- 138 questions on the review 26 days ≈ 5 problems per day in addition to extra practice and current homework.
- Set aside a NON-NEGOTIABLE time every day to practice. Put it in your calendar, planner, or phone. If something tries to interfere-say no. You WILL need more time to prepare for finals.
- Talk to your family and work about the time you will need to review for finals.
- 3. Identify the problems you KNOW WELL. Review, but focus on other areas.
- **4. Identify the problems you understand but HAVE NOT MASTERED.** Review these until you can consistently get them right. That means find the section in the textbook and work extra problems.
- 5. Identify the problems you struggle with or DO NOT KNOW. Get help to understand them and work to move them to category B or even better A. Work extra problems after getting help. Most of your time should be spent on these type of problems.
- 6. Identify how questions may be asked.
